EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Fiscal year 2009 marked a year of remarkably fruitful performance which hitched another gold in the university's studded records.

The transitional leadership of Dr. Rodrigo L. Malunhao as University Officer-In-Charge on its second lap proved a boost despite the economic crises that challenged his administration. His firm commitment and vast experiences as administrator has sustained the university's operation which also maintained excellence in all fields of academic endeavors at the same time holding on as one of the top performing schools in the country today.

Indeed, the University has embarked another milestone as it continues to strive for excellence in instruction, research, extension and production.

The following highlight the noteworthy accomplishments of the University for 2009.

A. INSTRUCTION

The strength of a university in instruction is anchored on the faculty. CMU has a strong faculty development program that supports the academic uplift of its mentors. This year, a total of 28 faculty

scholars were sent to different national and international schools. Ph. D. scholars soared to 18; 1 for DOE; 6 for MS and 1 each for MA and MOE. Of the 28 scholars, 10 were in different universities in Asia, Europe and Australia; 3 were in CMU while the rest were in the different universities in the Philippines.

With its tuition fee still the lowest among SUCs in Mindanao (Php 90.00 per unit), the university has a total enrolment of 17,446 students for the first and second semesters of SY 2009-2010 including summer 2009.

Performance in the Licensure Examination in 2009 has placed CMU among the top performing schools in the country in various disciplines. CMU ranked number 1 in Nutrition and Dietetics with 100% passing; 89% in Forestry with a 1st placer (For. Joseph C. Paquit) and a 5th placer (For. Aveen Q. Agbayani); number 2 in Agriculture (next to UP) with 60% passing; a 1st placer (Dr. Angelo C. Lagahid) and a 4th placer (Dr. Audry Rose R. Gabonada) in the board examination for Veterinarians given in August 2009; 100% passing in Mechanical Engineering; 100% passing in Accountancy, 75% in July and 100% passing in December 2009 for Nursing, and 81% passing in the November Licensure Examination for

Civil Engineers with Engineering still maintaining its top post in licensure examination.

This outstanding performance of graduates in various fields is an outcome of quality instruction from quality teachers, scholarships afforded to the students, good physical facilities and infrastructures, strong curricular offerings and conducive clean and green environment.

The Office of Student Affairs (OSA) released 2,038 approved applications for scholarship for SY 2009-2010 of which 707 were academic scholars, 882 non-academic scholars and 449 grant-in-aids scholarship (Barangay scholars, City scholars, BSDC scholars, DOST scholars, and other private corporations/ agencies offering scholarship to CMU students, etc.). For the second semester SY 2009-2010 it had processed a total of 1,670 students which are recipients of various scholarship grants.

A total of 116 scholarships were processed by the Office of the Director of Instruction (DOI) consisting of 45 CHED SAFE for Agriculture, 8 CHED SAFE for Education and Engineering, 4 CHED Full Merit, 10 CHED Half Merit, 10 CHED OTOS, 2 CHED Tulong-Dunong, 20 CIBAC, 4 San Miguel Community

Scholarship, 5 Antonio Florendo Foundation, 2 MENZI, 3 SunLife Financial Philippines, 1 East-West Seed Company and 1 from Del Monte Foundation. There were also 30 student assistants assigned in the various colleges and units of the University working a maximum of 40 hours per month at the rate of Php 10.00 per hour.

Per evaluation by CHED, CMU maintains its status as Center of Excellence (COE) in Agriculture; COE in Forestry; COE in Veterinary Medicine; Center of Development (COD) in Biology; and COD in Mathematics.

Job English Enabling Proficiency under the GEM-USAID project offered by CMU for the first time in the 2nd semester SY 2009-2010 was opened to all interested individuals. A total of 251 students enrolled in this program.

B. RESEARCH

The University Research has a total of twenty three (23) on-going researches for CY 2009. Of these studies, seventeen (17) were funded by CMU while six (6) were funded by external sources.

A total of twenty (20) research projects/studies were completed. Eighteen (18) of these completed researches were CMU funded while two (2) were funded by external sources.

The University Research Office had organized four (4) University Research Seminar Series and 4 conferences/symposia for the year 2009.

The CMU Annual In-House Review and Evaluation of On-going and Completed Researches was held on June 25-26, 2009 at Farmers Training Center, CMU. Winning Papers and Presentors were given awards during the review.



A total of 21 R & D papers, 13 completed research studies, 1 dissertations/thesis studies and 3 technical posters were presented and evaluated during the 21st NOMCARRD Research & Development Symposium Highlights (RRDSH) which was conducted on August 6-9, 2009 at Pearlmont Inn, CDO with the theme "Coping with Global Crises through Research and Development", CMU received major awards during the program: For AFNR - 1st & 2nd Place in Research Category; 1st & 3rd Place in Technical Poster Category; 1st Place in Development Category and for NON-AFNR – 1st Place in Research Category.

NOMCARRD is another unit of the University coordinating regional research and development/ extension priorities.

CMU researchers attended local, regional, national and international symposia and conferences.

C. EXTENSION

The University Extension has continued promoting its 13 major programs as tangible evidence of its continued support to the University's goals to provide technical expertise to the clienteles. Particularly, it had conducted 102 trainings along different commodities/ technologies to 3,404 participants and assisted 3,592 farmers, homemakers and OSY in 405 barangays, demonstrated 20 technologies, conducted 4 information-drives, attended 43 farmers meetings, visited 2,154 farms of their clienteles and served 1,501 visitors and office callers within and outside the Bukidnon province. It also developed 20 IEC materials which serve as reference for future use of technology.

Community-based Sustainable Development Program (COMBASUDEP), has 8 approved extension projects for 2009 from the eight colleges of the University: 3 were implemented at Dologon, Maramag, Bukidnon based on their training needs, while the

other 5 extension projects were implemented in other barangays and municipalities of Bukidnon.

The CMU- CHED UNLAD in Dologon Technology Park through its Swine Project - has produced 47 live piglets: 30 males and 17 females. Out of 30 weaned male piglets 28 were sold at Php 1,500.00 per head to pay for the feeds of the sows, and the remaining 3 piglets were given to a boar's share, while the seventeen (17) weaned female piglets were disposed to 14 farmers-cooperators in Barangay Dologon and 3 in Barangay Tubigon.



CMU- DAR MINSAD PROJECT - as of December 2009, has sold forty-one (41) heads of goats, 400 sacks of goat manure and 171 sacks of vermicast to different buyers giving a total income of Php 334,300.00 to the project thrust fund. The project has also served 481 visitors from the Visayas and different parts of Mindanao including local government officials, farmers, students and enthusiasts.



Project CLAIMS - the newest project of the University Extension approved by the University OIC, intended for members of the Bufallo, Tamaraw, Limus (BTL), a people's organization composed of

former land claimants of CMU under the government CARP. The University Extension employed expertise related to the farming activities of the BTL. During the 3rd quarter of 2009, the project has conducted four trainings on bag/rug making, vermiculture & vermicomposting and vegetable production to 77 BTL members.





PRODUCTION

The total gross income of the Business Management and Resources Development Office (BMRDO) as of December 2009 was Php 50,084,487.16. This gross income consisted of toll and terminal fees, other service income, sales revenue, other business income, miscellaneous income, and gain on sale of assets. The total expenses were Php 34,183,384.49 giving a total net income of 15,901,102.67 from January to December 2009 operations.



The University Food & Lodging Services (UFLS) registered a total net income of Php 2,508,280.04.



The Residence halls under the management of the Office of Student Affairs Personnel generated a total income of 4,063,134 as of December 2009.

For this year, the Instructional Materials Development Center has produced a total of 30,325 copies of learning materials, which earned about three million fifty four thousand, eight hundred fifteen pesos (Php3,054,815.00) which tantamounts to a sixty-five percent (65%) increase compared to last year's production of 18,341 copies giving only a total income of (Php 1,964,123.00).

D. ADMINISTRATION

As of December 2009, the total manpower of the University was 1,305 personnel consisting of teaching and non-teaching employees, casual, part timers and contractual/job orders.

CMU, through its Financial Management Office, generated an income from tuition fees and other school fees. It had marked a total income of Php 69,589,565.92 under trust fund 164.

The University has Support Services such as University Hospital, University Food and Lodging Services, Residence Halls for graduate and nongraduate students, General Services which is responsible for the repair of the University transport and housing facilities, Security Services which maintains the stability of peace and order of the University campus, and others.



ACCOMPLISHMENTS







INSTRUCTION

As an academic paradise of higher learning, the provider of highest quality education in Mindanao, CMU has continued its commitment to produce globally competitive graduates that will contribute to the socio-economic development of the country in general.

As an institution of higher learning, the University offers 29 undergraduate degree programs through nine professional colleges and 33 highly specialized graduate degree programs through the Graduate School. It also offers short-term Special Courses and secondary education, including TESDA competency courses. In November 2009, CMU has also launched its Job English Enabling Proficiency (JEEP) Program.


I. FACULTY PROFILE

CMU academic programs were implemented by highly qualified, competent and dedicated faculty members (Table 1.)




Fig. 1 Faculty Profile of Central Mindanao University based on educational attainment and rank.

As of December 2009, there were 285 regular faculty members, 1 job order, and 60 part-timers. Of the 346 faculty members, 73 are holders of doctoral degrees, 149 of master's degrees and 123 had baccalaureate degrees. In terms of academic ranks, 34 are full professors, 96 are associate professors, 69 assistant professors and 147 instructors (Figure 1).

II. FACULTY DEVELOPMENT

There were twenty-eight (28) faculty scholars for the Second Semester SY 2008-2009 while there were 27 faculty scholars for the First Semester SY 2009-2010. Of these 27 scholars this semester, five (5) were new, eleven (11) were on-going, and eight (8) were on extension. These scholars were enrolled in twenty (20) schools in the Philippines and abroad and were financed by nineteen (19) different kinds of scholarship grants (Table 2 & 3).

As of First Semester SY 2009-2010, six (6) faculty scholars have reinstated to service after finishing their respective degrees while one (1) reinstated on continuing status (Table 5).

To keep abreast of the recent innovations and technologies, several faculty members were also allowed to attend seminar-workshops and other pertinent activities related to their respective fields of specialization.

III. ENROLMENT

With an utmost desire to accommodate more underprivileged but deserving students, enrollment for the First Semester SY 2009-2010 has tremendously increased from 6,713 to 8,139 distributed in the different colleges of the University, the Graduate School, and University Laboratory High School. Table 7 shows the enrolment of the University for SY 2009-2010. In Second Semester SY 2009-2010, enrolment slightly dropped to 7,627. 


Fig. 2 CMU Enrolment for the period indicated.

A total of 1,094 were conferred in 2009: 816 graduates in April 2009, 82 graduates in June 2009 and 196 in November 2009 (Table 8)




Fig. 3 Graduates of CMU for 2nd Sem SY 2009-2009, Summer 2009, and 1st Sem SY 2009-2010.




Fig. 4 CMU passing percentage was always higher compared to the National passing percentage.


VI. STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP AND RECOGNITION

Deserving students in the University have access to scholarships (academic, socio-cultural, socialized and leadership) and other grants-in-aid from government and private entities.

As of First Semester SY 2009 - 2010, a total of 2,038 students are recipients of various scholarship

Grants: 707 were academic scholars, 882 non-academic scholars and 449 grant-in-aids recipients. In the 2nd semester a total of 1, 670 are recipients .

Academic scholarship includes: University scholar (GWA-1.0-1.45), College scholars(GWA -1.5-1.75), Full and Partial Entrance scholar, Valedictorian, Salutatorian and CMU-Self scholar (GWA of 1.76 -2.0).



CMU sponsored non-academic scholarship includes: Socialized tuition fee scheme, Socio-cultural scholarship, Leadership grants, ROTC Advance and BSDC scholars.

Gov. Jose Ma. Zubiri with Dr. Malunhao who offered 14 full scholarships to selected CMU students and another 200 students provided with P1,000 monthly stipend

Grant-in-Aids Scholarship includes Provincial/ City Scholars, Barangay scholars, Elected SK Chairman and SK Kagawad, DOST, CHED, otherwise, private agencies like: DMFI, SMC, MENZI, Sun Life Financial

Phils. Foundations, East West Seed Company Inc. and Don Antonio Floriendo Foundations, Inc. were also offering scholarship grants to deserving students of CMU (Table 11, 12 & 13).



RESEARCH

Central Mindanao University as an institution of higher learning, has strived for excellence in research as a hallmark of a real University. Research generates knowledge, and knowledge is important pre-requisite for development. The CMU Research Department is engaged in research activities which resulted in generation of knowledge and technologies that will eventually improved the quality of life, total people empowerment, food security and sustainable development of natural resources for a progressive humane society.

The University Research Office had the following accomplishments from January to December 2009.

I. Major Research Activities

The University Museum

- The University Museum is one of the places frequently visited by visitors. For the period under review, it had served 1,221 visitors.
- Exhibits at the lobby of the museum are changed every 2 months to show dynamics and interesting exhibits.
- Specimens data-basing is one of the activities of the museum. The botany sections has data based 6,500 specimens and catalogued according to their families, genera and species.





The Mt. Musuan Zoological & Botanical Garden

- Maintained the endemic, rare and ornamental plants as well as other wildlife.
- Established and initiated vermin culture as well as nursery.
- A horse riding was offered to visitors of MMZBG and a P10/ per hour is imposed for the maintenance and feeds /vitamins of the horse.
- Construction of the Tourist Information Center and Conference Hall is almost done, funded by Philippine Tourism Authority.
- Documented 78 plant species in a 1-ha plot through research, 65 of which is genera and had 36 families; and recorded a total of 419 individual kinds of trees;

• Received a total of 29,567 visitors/ climbers and generated a total income of Php 95,952.00 as of November 2009.

V. Linkages

The University Research has established linkages with NorMinCoHRD(Northern Mindanao Consortium for Health research and Development), CHED, DABAR, UPLB, National Seed Industry, PhilRice, LBP, DAR, NRCP, CEPF-CI, DOST- PCARRD, DENR, Philippine Eagle Foundation, SEARCA, DOST, Ateneo de Manila University, Kasetsart University of Bangkok, Thailand, ILTER, DIVERSITAS and University of Maine, USA.

The Philippine Eagle Foundation has deposited some of their faunal collection in our University Museum since it has been authorized by the DENR as repository of biological specimens in Mindanao.

VI. Other Research Unit in the University

NOMCARRD

Northern Mindanao Consortium for Agriculture and Resources Research and Development (NOMCARRD) is an organization of 18 agencies coordinating regional research and development/extension priorities.

NOMCARRD also plans, monitors and evaluates integrated researches in agriculture, fisheries, forestry and natural resources. It serves as the regional arm of National Agriculture and Resources Resources and Development Network (NARRDN) under the Philippine Council for Agriculture, Forestry and Natural Resources Research and Development (PCARRD).

This office envisioned to become a prime mover in agricultural productivity and modernizations through well - coordinated research and development programs in agriculture, fisheries, forestry, environmental and natural resources and the exponent of rapid dissemination, transfer, adoption and commercialization of environmentally sound technologies for sustainable development.

A. R & D Management

Conducted Commodity Team Meeting on March 6, 2009 at the Mindanao University of Science & Technology (MUST) Conference Room. The meeting was participated by 18 program proponents coming from the member agencies of NOMCARRD: CMU, MSU-IIT, DENR, MOSCAT, MUST and XU, which was attended by RRDCC Chair, Dir. Angelito C. Alolod, Dr. Anthony M. Penaso and Deputy Consortium Director, Prof. Lucerne M. Razalo. The meeting includes finalization of proposals on top 3 commodities (Bamboo, Swine and Goat) for submission to PCARRD. Bamboo & Swine/yellow Corn Programs were endorsed to PCARRD on March 30, 2009.

The 121st RTWG meeting was held on March 20, 2009 at MUST Conference room, Cagayan de Oro City. The meeting involves evaluation of proposal entitled "Echo Training on Technical Report Writing", other activities includes Reactivation of Regional Experts Pools (REP) based on different priority commodities of NOMCARRD.

The LDCU, BSU & MVC were evaluated on May 6, 12 & 14, 2009 as member agency applicants to NOMCARRD. Application was then approved during the 11th RRDCC Meeting held on June 5, 2009 at DENR-10, CDO.

The symposium aimed to evaluate researches conducted by the different member agencies of the consortium and to establish future R&D directions in agriculture, forestry, natural resources and environment. There were 58 R & D papers, 6 dissertations /thesis studies and 26 technical posters presented and evaluated during the symposium.

- Holding a two-day planning workshop in collaboration with DA-NOMIARC on September 29-30, 2009 at DA-NOMIARC Conference Room, Dalwangan, Malaybalay City. The workshop aimed to revisit the 2005-2010 RIRDEAP, and identify & prioritize RDE agenda for region 10. Participants were directors and heads of member agencies and representatives of private and non-government organizations.
- Conducted NOMCARRDwide Lakbay Aral in Region 11 on June 8-11, 2009. This aims to expose the participants to advance farming practices based on focus commodities of NOMCARRD and learn the FITS Center management and operations. There were 27 participants composed of FITS managers, TSS, ISS, MS, NOMCARRD officials & staff who joined the lakbay aral with SMARRDEC assisted the activity.

The training courses aimed to harness the members capabilities to prepare and package winning R&D proposals, while developing their leadership and management skills in R&D. In the long term, it is hoped that this critical pool of researchers could act as trainers/ mentors/ project and propel PSAI to become a viable and sustainable organization of scholar leaders.
- Dr. Raul C. Orongan, CMU and Dr. Genaro V. Japos, LDCU and Dr. Hitaas of BSU attended the training course on Research Design/ Statistical Analysis and Data Interpretation last May 18-22, 2009 at PCARRD Los Baños, Laguna. The course aimed to enhance the participants' understanding of the concepts of research design, statistical analysis and data interpretation and improve the quality of their research programs/projects.

EXTENSION

THE UNIVERSITY EXTENSION

As the reaching arm of the University, the Extension Office is responsible in bringing about desirable changes among people in its service area, thus help achieve relevance of university's curricular programs to address community problems, needs and resources.

I. Extension Programs and Its Accomplishments

In 2009, The University Extension has continued promoting its 12 major programs through its CMU-COMBASUDEP, CMU-BIDANI, CMU-DAR MINSAD and Entrepreneurial Project for Homemakers and OSY and other related programs. Most of these trainings conducted by the different colleges were related and part of their extension activities approved in 2008 which terminated in February 2009.

Among its accomplishments as of January to December 2009 are the following:

- Conducted 13 extension programs
- Assisted 405 barangays
- Conducted 102 trainings
- Trained 920 persons
- Asssisted 2,603 farmers
- Developed 20 IEC materials

- Demonstrated 20 technologies
- Conducted 4 Info-drives
- Served 1,501 visitors and office callers
- Attended 43 farmers meetings
- Conducted 2,154 farm & home visits

II. Updates On Extension Programs

CMU COMBASUDEP

The Community-based Sustainable Development Program (COMBASUDEP), the extension program through the colleges, has eight approved extension projects for 2009 from the eight colleges of the University: three are implemented at Dologon, Maramag, Bukidnon based on their training needs, while the other four extension projects are implemented in other barangays and municipalities of Bukidnon. As agreed by the members of the University Extension Committee, these projects are implemented starting June 2009 to end May 2010.

In particular, the College of Veterinary Medicine implements its Brgy. Animal Health Worker Development Project (BAHWDP) at Panadtalan, Maramag, Bukidnon; the College of Arts and Sciences project on Using Content-based & Interdisciplinary

Approaches in Teaching Elem Subjects (CBIDATES) is implemented in the Division of Valencia City; the CollegeofHomeEconomicsprojectonEntrepreneurial Skills Development Project (CHEES-DEP) includes Maramag and Valencia City and the College of Education project on Mentoring Assistance for Community Empowerment (MACE) and the College of Commerce & Accountancy on Department - based Continuing Management education Mentoring Assistance in Southern Bukidnon.

The CMU- CHED UNLAD

The CMU- CHED UNLAD in Dologon Technology Park through its Swine Project has produced 47 live piglets: 30 males and 17 females and dispersed to 14 farmer-cooperators in Brgy. Dologon and 3 farmer-cooperators in Brgy. Tubigon. Weaned male piglets were sold at Php 1,500.00 per head to pay for the feeds of the sows.

•On Goat Project however, it incurred 5 mortalities: 1 buck and 4 does died with only 11 goats survived. LGU Dologon is waiting for the construction of a suitable animal shed to transfer the goats into a specified area conducive for the establishment of pasture for forage grasses to feed the animals.

• On Farmers Information Technology Services (FITS) Center at Barangay Dologon was launched last November 2008 with 19 titles of different commodities packaged by the Information Communication Unit of the University Extension. Based on the logboook, there were 25 persons who have been reading the materials.

• On Vegetable Technology Park – it had earned a total gross income of Php 45,398 from sales of various vegetables including sweet potato and corn on cobs marketed to CMU employee and students.

CMU - BIDANI

• During the period under review, the program has conducted thirteen (13) trainings to 670 participants in Brgy. Dologon, Panadtalan, BTL and Valencia City. (Please see appendix for more trainings).

CMU-DAR KFCRD - IADP

•The Department of Agrarian Reform has initiated the re-establishment of the Kalahi Farmers Center for Rural Development (KFCRD) at Central Mindanao University with the conduct of a re-orientation meeting last May 2009. As part of the KFCRD activities, the institutionalized DAR Integrated Agricultural Development Project (IADP) has assisted 98 farmers in four agrarian reform communities (ARCs) in North Poblacion, Maramag; Salawagan, Quezon; Brgy. Aquino, Kalilangan; and Lower Kulaman, Sumilao. The technologies demonstrated in the different ARCs which received financial input through the IADP include: upgraded goat production, organic lowland rice production, handicraft production, vermin-

composting and rice mill operation. However, the handicraft production and vermi-composting projects in Salawagan, Quezon are still on capability building stage without financial assistance involved.





During the CY 2009, the Techno-demo Services Unit of the University Extension has collected Php13,518.00 as repayment to new inputs loans provided to the farmer-cooperators of the IADP.

CMU-DAR MINSAD

• As of December 2009, the CMU-DAR MINSAD Techno-demo Project on Goat Purebreeding & Production has 204 heads of goats in its inventory. The project has sold 41 heads of goats, 400 sacks of goat manure and 171 sacks of vermicast to different buyers giving a total income of Php 334,300.00 to the project thrust fund.

• The project has also served 481 visitors from Visayas and different parts of Mindanao including local government officials, farmers, students and enthusiasts.



• For the Smallholder Dairy Project - CMU continues to provide technical expertise to the settlement areas in the procurement of dairy cows for dispersal to farmers. Moreover, their plans are

underway to continue to extend to the farmercooperators of the project in maintaining the health and milk of their dairy cows.

Entrepreneurial Project for Homemakers and OSY

During the period under review:

- Twelve (12) trainings on handicraft making were conducted to none KFCRD areas to 434 participants, 289 of whom were females with 145 male participants.
- Eleven (11) trainings were conducted on food preservation and processing with 215 female and only 9 male participants.
- As of December 2009, a total of 2,554 items of handicraft products were sold giving a total of Php 74,930.00 sales utilized in the procurement of materials and/or saved as trust fund for other extension projects.

NEDA- KR2 Small-Scale Processing of Dairy Products

This is a project funded by the National Economic Development Authority of Region 10 implemented by the College of Home Economics and supervised by the University Extension. In 2009, the project was able to develop dairy techno-packs on ice-cream, butter, flavored milk, choco milk and pastries.

Information Dissemination

During the CY 2009, the unit has conducted 4 infodrives with 180 participants in Mailag, Malaybalay (62 pax); Lantapan, Bukidnon (38 pax); South Poblacion, Maramag (38 pax) and Lurogan, Valencia City (42 pax).





Project Claims

Project claims is the newest project of the University Extension approved by the University OIC. The project is intended for members of the Bufallo, Tamaraw, Limus (BTL), a people's organization composed former land claimant of CMU under the government CARP.

During the third quarter of 2009, 4 trainings on bag/rug making, vermiculture and vermicomposting and vegetable production were conducted to 77 BTL members.

PRODUCTION

Production is the fourth major function of the University which is under the Business Management and Resources Development Office (BMRDO). It focuses on the production, protection, management and development of the agri-based and forest-based entrepreneurships in order to generate income as well as to provide support services to instruction, research and extension.

The BMRDO is directly under the Office of the University President whose head is designated as Special Assistant to the President (SAP).

The University Officer -In-Charge has appointed new SAP in the person of Dr. Louella M. Cabahug vice Prof. Rodrigo C. Bayawa the former SAP of BMRDO whose designation was terminated in the 1st quarter of this year.

The BMRDO has two (2) divisions of production projects: 1.) Agribusiness Division (AD) with a total of 22 production projects; 2) Forest Resources Development Division (FRDD) with 3 projects.

Agribusiness production projects includes crop production projects such as: Lowland rice (inbred), Lowland rice seed (Seednet), Upland rice crops (crops), Corn seed (OPV), Yellow corn, Fruit crops plantation, Plantation crops nursery, Rubber, Coffee, Cacao, Cassava and Rice Mill project while Animal production projects includes: Fishpond, Beef, Dairy, Goat, Sheep, Poultry, Swine, vermiculture and Feedmill. On the other hand, the FRDD Division includes: (1) Forest Nursery Sections such as Timber harvesting, Saw Milling, Carpentry and Furniture; (2) Forest Establishment and Maintenance Section and



(3) Forest Protection Section.

To support the operation of the two divisions of the BMRDO, the MEMU (Machinery & Equipments Maintenance Unit) was established to provide the maintenance and operation of the equipments used by BMRDO.

Under the Administration of the new SAP, the following accomplishments were achieved:

I. MANPOWER RESOURCES

As of December 2009, the total number of manpower resources of the BMRDO was 420, of which 62 were plantilla items and 338 job order contract workers. There were 20 personnel whose wages were charged to BMRDO had been assigned to other units/colleges in the University.

II. INCOME FROM DIFFERENT PROJECTS OF BMRDO

•The total gross income of BMRDO as of December 2009 was Php 50,084,487.16. The gross income came from sales revenue (PhP5,204,376.89), toll and terminal fees other service income, interest income

(PhP 17,398.38), miscellaneous income and gain on sale of assets (PhP264,144.58), and non-cash/stock inventory (PhP5,287,359.54). The total expenses incurred was Php 34,183,384.49 giving a net income of Php 15,901,102.67. Out of this net income Php 6,301,335.50 is cash available and in position with the BMRDO and the difference is an inventory income.

- Total value of products sold and disposed for the period January to December 2009 was Php. 44,903,194.43. Of this, Php 20,156,340.93 was cash sales, Php 12,480,303.99 credit sales and Php12,266,549.51 transfer of fund collections/accounts.
- The MEMU (Machinery & Equipments Maintenance Unit) was able to raise a gross income from Machinery services in the amount of Php 4,032,169.97 minus expenses of Php 2,262,994.20 giving a net income of Php 1,769,175.77.

- Additional purchase of 10 units turtle /rotavator with engine and five (5) units thresher with engine to augment the existing farm machineries of the lowland projects.
- Lowland Rice Project. As of December 2009, the total area planted with commercial rice were 332.4 hectares, 214.4 hectares were planted with commercial rice, 31.0 hectares were planted with hybrid rice using 135H variety, 87.0 hectares for inbred rice seed, and 1.0 hectare for upland rice seed multiplication.



• Farm road construction, rehabilitation of five (5) kilometers and partially graveled at the lowland and rubber projects with assistance from NIA heavy equipments was done.

• The Rubber Production Project had produced 162,623.30 kilograms of assorted rubber product and by-products. Of this production, 118,920.0 were cup lump and coagulum disposed/sold within the first half of the year, while 43,703.30 kilograms were processed into rubber creep which were also disposed/sold. Stocks available totaled to 26,412.60 and 16,000.0 kilograms of cup lump/coagulum and 10,412.6 rubber creep, respectively, ready for disposal.



• For the Rubber Plantation, there was an expansion of 3.0 hectares planted with IRRM 600 rubber clone. A total of 1,260.0 rubber seedlings (IRRM 600) was produced of which 580.0 seedlings were cut-backed and bagged.



• Disposed/sold seedlings were as follows: 4,305.0 budded rubber seedlings; rambutan 609; grafted lanzones 306.0; mango 114.0; durian 61; Grafted santol 20.0; grafted suha 6.0 and grafted pomelo 70.0. As of December 2009 the available unsold seedlings of any kinds were; 700 grafted, 4,000 budded; 3,000 opening; 3,000 cutbacked; 3,000 uprooting; 3,000

bagging and 900 pruning.

• The Goat and Sheep Projects were expanded at the coconut project area. In collaboration with MINSSAD project, goat stocks were improved in terms of breed lines e.g. boer and anglo-nubian mestiso breeds.



- The fishpond project continued its operations under the BMRDO budget with two (2) laborers assigned. There were 40, 000 fingerlings cultured in the pond which raised up to 1,124.90 kilos of harvested fish and giving a total sales of 76,519.75 as of December 2009.
 - Feed Mill has no operation for the period.
- Rice Mill Project milled a total of 316,657.78 kilograms of palay with an output milled rice distributed as follows: 211,637.0 kilograms clean rice; kilograms broken rice 12,290.0; 18,377.0 kilograms binlud and 4,169 kilograms of fancy rice (pilit).
- The total value of agricultural inputs (fertilizers and chemicals) and other stocks available in the stockroom was worth Php 5,032,458.00 and total worth of drugs and biologics is PhP408,073.18.

- Cassava and upland crops production projects have started copping this year. The Cassava project had planted 22.0 hectares of assorted varieties e.g. Yellow, PAVAR and Visca varieties. As of December 2009 the cassava project had raise a total gross income of 832,385.40 less expenses of 830,838.14 giving a net income of 1,547.26. Budget of which is charged against lowland rice production allotment. Upland rice projects focused its operation to seed multiplication.
- Corn project area has been reduced from 20 hectares last year to 16.25 hectares this season as corn areas intercropped with rambutan last season is no longer available.
- The Forest Resources and Development Division is composed of the Forest Nursery, Forest Establishment and Maintenance, Timber Harvesting, Saw Milling, Carpentry and Furniture Sections. Seed collected and bagged were 137.50 kilos and 12,7000.0 bags, respectively. A total of 382.44 cubic meters of logs that were felled, bucked and hauled to the CMU sawmill and to Yemane Traders. Firelines establishment have been done and six (6) grass fire occurred with one (1) very damaging of almost 70% of the Musuan peak cover were burned.

• The BMRDO management did not increased prices of all commodities and by-products.

III. OTHER INCOME GENERATING PROJECTS OF THE UNIVERSITY

INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS DEVELOPMENT CENTER

This unit is in-charge for the production of learning materials like laboratory workbooks, handouts and other reading materials. For this year, the center has produced a total of 30,325 copies of instructional materials, which earned about three million fifty four thousand, eight hundred fifteen pesos (Php3,054,815.00) which is tantamount to sixty-five percent (65%) increase compared to last year's production of 18,341 copies giving only a total income of (Php 1,964,123.00).

RESIDENCE HALLS FOR STUDENTS

The University has provided ten (10) Residence Halls for both undergraduate and graduate students located inside the campus and accessible to transportation.













For the year 2009, the Residence Halls generated a total income of Php 4,018,094.00, out of which Php3,868,810.00 came from dormitory rentals and Php149,284.40 income from payments of electrical appliances.


THE UNIVERSITY FOOD AND LODGING SERVICES

The University Food and Lodging Services is one of the major production units of the university. It is an income generating project which operates the food processing, catering and lodging services that serves the general populace of the University including transient visitors and field trippers. It also serves as the venue for trainings / seminars and reception to special occasion.

This unit is manned by 33 personnel. As of January to December 2009 they had served 2, 765 clients for lodging services and served 17,219 for catering services viz. seminars & weddings, etc.

The UFLS had earned a total gross income of Php 6,531,296.99. From CEC it had earned a total gross income of Php 12,388,379.82, from swimming Pool

Php 326,483.89 from the Mahogany Dorm Canteen Php 570,580.87 and Php 233,287.35 from Show Window in front of main gate.




ADMINISTRATION


I. HUMAN RESOURCE AND FISCAL MANAGEMENT

As of December 2009, the University has a total manpower of 1,305 personnel broken down as shown in the figures below.





There were 346 (22%) teaching personnel, out of which 225 (65%) were permanent, 60 (17%) were temporary and 61 (18%) with Part-time status of appointment.




On non-teaching personnel, a total of 1,229 (78%) comprises of 724 (59%) personnel on plantilla, 477 (39%) job orders including the BRMRO staff assigned in different projects, 20 (2) casuals and only 6 were contractual.

The manpower of CMU was reduced to 6% compared to last years 2008 total manpower which is 1,387, this reduction observed is due to economic crisis that hits CMU rather.

FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT OFFICE

This unit is primarily tasked with managing the financial resources of the University. It includes budget execution, budget accountability and coordinating with outside offices concerned with government funds.

For FY 2009, CMU received a total allotment of Php 236,471,000 for its operation.

Percentage of allotment by Expense


The University has generated income from tuition fees and other school charges.

For 2009, it generated a total income of Php 69,589,565.92 under Trust Fund 164.

Central Mindanao University catered a total of 18,697 students for the 1st & 2nd semesters of SY 2009-2010 and this was translated into a total of Forty-eight Million Three Hundred Fifty-five Thousand Eight Hundred Thirty-nine pesos and 78/100 (Php 48,355,839.78) of income collected from students.

The University has also collected a total of Twenty-one Million Two Hundred Thirty-three Thousand Seven Hundred Twenty-six pesos and 14/100 (21,233,726.14) from its operations for a total income of Sixty-nine Million Five Hundred Eighty-

nine Thousand Five Hundred Sixty-five pesos and 92/100) for 2009.

II. SUPPORT SERVICES

THE CMU SECURITY SERVICES

The CMU Security Services as an instrument for stability of peace and order, is tasked to protect lives and ensure the security and safety of all CMU occupants and to safeguard all government properties of the University.

The office has earned a total of 112,150.00 pesos derived from its share from the gate pass (road right of way), impoundment of astray and tethered animals, fines from campus and traffic road violations and etc., which is deposited to its trust fund.

The University Security Services has rendered the following services:

 - 41 cases of theft, majority occurred in private

residents

- 19 cases of robbery incidents
- 25 cases of harassments/ threats involving students, employees & outsiders
- 15 cases where students violated curfew hours
- 2 cases suspected of possessing illegal drugs/ marijuana inside CMU premises & recovery of marijuana potted hills
- Cases on entry of outsiders with 7 suspicious looking person roaming around CMU vicinity without legitimate purpose.
- 39 cases where doors of government buildings left unlocked.
- 31 cases on vehicular accidents.
- 84 cases impoundment of astray animals tethered inside CMU premises.

The cases enumerated above were properly investigated and appropriate disciplinary measures were instituted.

THE CHIEF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE

This office plans, supervises and coordinates the activities of the administrative services support staff. It is also directly supervises personnel of the University Internal Audit Services, University Planning, Management Information System (MIS) and Auxiliary Services.





The Auxiliary Services Unit generated an income of Php 78,501.75 from University Convention Center rentals, Php 214,264.42 from Commercial Complex, Php 2,088,240.00 from water bills and Php 359,257.74 from renewals of housing contracts and rentals, rental of photocopier (Php22,100.00) and garbage fees (Php 209,220.00), share from small business (Php 14,375.00) and share from accepting lodgers (Php152,145.00).



THE INCOME OUTREACH PROJECT (IOP)

This unit provides and facilitates loans to students through direct student funds and salary deduction schemes. it is also liable in monitoring the university's share on government and private homeowners accepting boarders and lodgers inside the CMU campus.

THE CAMPUS LANDSCAPING AND BEAUTIFICATION DEVELOPMENT PROJECT (CLBDP)

This unit initiates, coordinates and implemented plans for landscaping, beautification, physical development and maintenance of the University campus grounds.

• Facilitated and prepared program of work, procurement, job orders, trip tickets and other related office works.

THE UNIVERSITY HOUSING TASK FORCE (UHTF)

The University Housing Task Force is charged with the monitoring, evaluation and accommodation of government and privately owned cottages built inside the CMU periphery. Among its accomplishments were the following:




A total of 27,126 clients consulted in the Out-Patient Department from January to December 2009.



For the 2009 operation, it had served a total of 28,241 in and out patients/clients. Among its clients were students, employees and their dependents and individuals suffering from various ailments.







III. OTHER OFFICES DIRECTLY UNDER THE OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT

THE UNIVERSITY CENTER FOR GENDER AND DEVELOPEMNT (UCGAD)

This office is mandated to help implement the government's development agenda that is empowering, equitable and true for all regardless of age, sex, religion and ethnic origin" within the university and the region it serves.

THE UNIVERSITY ARCHIVES

THE LEGAL OFFICE

The Legal Office is tasked primarily to provide legal advice and assistance to the university President and to the various units in the university. Its mandate is to see to it that the University operates within the confines of law, and that its interest, rights, privileges are legally enforced and protected.

Upon the resignation of the former Legal Officer, the position was presumed temporarily by Mr. George Caesar B. Gewan – acting as Legal Officer of the University.

THE INSPECTORATE TEAM FOR SUPPLIES AND MATERIALS (ITSM)

This office is responsible for the inspection and preparation of reports on all deliveries of supplies, materials and equipment to the University and other business related activities involving the CEC, PCC, Tea Room, BMRDO including semi-expandable and expandable materials which are to be condemned and disposed of. The following are the accomplishments from January to December 2009.

THE UNIVERSITY PLANNING, MONITORING, EVALUATION AND PHYSICAL PLANT DEVELOPMENT OFFICE (UPMEPPDO)

The creation of the Office was approved by the BOR on September 3, 2009 by virtue of Resolution No. 63, s. 2009. The office is headed by Engr. Leoncio Mariano C. Acma as Director. The office was created out of the University Planning Office and Engineering Technical Planning Services. It has three components namely University Planning Office, Land Use Planning and Development; and Physical Plant Development Office lump into one unit called UPMEPPDO.

This Office has spearheaded and coordinated various activities in the University. Streamlining of the University-wide developmental plans including land use planning and implementation of physical structures are among its major concerns.


accomplishment report of the University.


